

Perkiomen Watershed Conservation Corps

The Perkiomen Watershed Conservation Corps program is a youth-based program dedicated to furthering the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy's mission of protecting the watershed's land and water resources. Members help achieve this mission while cultivating their own conservation and community engagement skills through the participation in hands-on service learning opportunities.

Experiential Education and Service Learning

The Perkiomen Watershed Conservation Corps (PWCC) focuses on experiential environmental education and service learning for local high school youth. Members participate in service events focused on ecological land management, watershed stewardship, and community outreach, integrated with instruction and reflection to enrich learning while promoting civic responsibility. The program equips members with valuable conservation and community engagement skills and experiences as they enter college, internships, and/or the workforce.

Member Requirements

In order to provide a full and meaningful experience within the PWCC, members are held to the following criteria, listed below. A "Successful Member" will complete at least the minimum requirements listed under "Program Requirements," participate in the fundraising event. All "Successful Members" are eligible to participate in the program's capstone project, the Perki-Bay Expedition.

Program Requirements

- 1) **Monthly meeting attendance**. Monthly meetings are designed to engage PWCC members with one another and Conservancy Staff and allow time for reflection about previous and upcoming service opportunities. These meetings are critical to the education and context component of the service learning experience. Members discuss important themes and topics highlighted during events, learn about environmental issues and solutions, and review upcoming service opportunities. PWCC members must attend a minimum of three monthly meetings. Unless otherwise noted, monthly meetings take place at 6:30 PM on the first Tuesday of each month from January to June at the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy headquarters. The monthly meeting dates are as follows.

- 2) Event attendance. Environmental education is at the core of everything the Conservancy does. PWCC's environmental education component is largely implemented by engaging in hands-on projects with and under the direction of Conservancy staff. The Conservancy offers a variety of hands-on projects throughout the year for PWCC members to gain unique environmental and conservation education experiences. <u>Each member is required to attend a minimum of five events or projects during the program cycle</u>. A few common educational themes and examples of events/projects are listed below:
 - Watershed Stewardship Stream Clean-up
 - Stormwater Management Rain Garden Maintenance & Installation, Rain Barrel Workshop
 - Ecological Restoration Riparian Buffer Planting, Native Plantings
 - Water Quality Analysis Water Quality Monitoring Program
 - Native Plant Identification Native Plant Sale & Native Plant Project opportunities
 - Invasive Plant Management European Water Chestnut Removal, Native Planting Maintenance
 - Community Engagement Lenape Challenge, Perkiomen Creek Sojourn
- 3) Canoe Skills/Concepts Workshop. Each member is required to attend at least one Canoe Skills and Concepts workshop led by Conservancy staff. These canoeing workshops will prepare PWCC members for their participation in the Perki-Bay Expedition. Workshops will be held on the Perkiomen Creek at the Conservancy headquarters and/or the Walt Road Day Use Area in Green Lane Park.
- 4) Capstone Research Project. As a final capstone to the PWCC experience, each member is required to research a specific watershed management issue or relevant outdoor recreation topic and write a one-page, double spaced report about that topic. Members participating in the Perki-Bay Expedition will use the knowledge from their research report to create a short video segment about the topic during the trip. The topic selected must pertain to something that may be encountered or experienced during the Perki-Bay Expedition. Articles are due to Beth Myers, via email on Thursday, June 20th. Topics could include, but are not limited to:
 - Stormwater Pollution
 - Invasive Species Hydrilla, Eurasian Water-Milfoil or other aquatic or terrestrial invasive species
 - Water Quality Degradation
 - Portaging
 - Dams
 - Riparian buffers
 - Camping
 - Packing for an Expedition
 - Fundraising
 - PWC
 - Erosion
 - Difference in industries lining waterways
 - Another topic that interests you. Email Beth for approval.

Attire and Dress Code

PWCC conservation work occurs mostly outdoors in a variety of conditions, including but not limited to: weather (rain, cold, heat, humidity, wind), uneven or steep terrain, thick vegetation, thorns, poison ivy, ticks, stinging insects, dirt and mud, etc. To ensure participant safety, **PWCC members should wear durable and protective clothing and footwear** while participating in Conservancy events. We suggest wearing long pants, tall socks, sturdy sneakers or boots, and a long sleeve t-shirt depending on weather. Please also bring a hat, sunscreen, and jacket or coat with you. Always dress appropriately for the weather, temperature, and project/event. It is always a good idea to dress in layers. Perki-Bay Expedition and Fundraising

About the Expedition: The Perki-Bay Expedition is a self-sustained, 50-mile canoeing and camping trip, launching from Red Fox Park in Schwenksville and concluding at Fort Mifflin in Philadelphia. The Expedition occurs at the end of each program cycle during the last full week of June. <u>In 2024, the trip will be Monday, June 24th through Friday, June 28th.</u> The watershed expedition serves three purposes:

- 1) Members experience firsthand three major south-eastern PA waterways (Perkiomen Creek, Schuylkill River, and Delaware River), and their associated ecological and land use changes.
- 2) Members utilize and synthesize conservation, education, and recreation skills and knowledge obtained during the preceding program months, including paddling, native plant identification, water quality testing, etc.
- 3) Members conduct hydrological analysis of major waterways and tributaries along the Expedition route. The Perkiomen Creek, Skippack Creek, Schuylkill River, Wissahickon Creek, and Delaware River are all surveyed. The results of these analyses will be recorded in the Conservancy's database that logs data from previous Expedition years.

Fundraising: In order to conduct such an extraordinary venture, PWCC members and Conservancy staff organize a fundraiser to help offset expenses. Members and staff also run a media campaign to raise awareness for the PWCC program and the Conservancy as an organization. Each member attending the Expedition is highly encouraged to raise the funds necessary to participate. The Conservancy will host a fundraising event to assist PWCC members in achieving their individual fundraising goals. <u>Each PWCC member has an expedition fundraising goal of \$250</u>. The fundraising event is discussed during the first or second monthly meeting and PWCC members brainstorm fundraising opportunities that interest them the most. Raising funds is not mandatory, but is highly encouraged.

A Final Word

These requirements are not intended to be daunting. Their purpose is to ensure that each member receives a well-rounded experience that exposes them to a variety of environmental topics and introduces them to conservation field work while providing meaningful service to the Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy. At the conclusion of the program cycle, successful PWCC members have the opportunity to participate in the Perki-Bay Watershed Expedition. A successful member will have the knowledge and skill base that enables them to fully engage in the expedition and research project, while promoting the Conservancy and its mission. Further, successful program participants obtain a greater awareness of watershed stewardship than they had prior to joining the PWCC, and can draw on that knowledge throughout the course of their lives.

Staffing the PWCC Program

The Conservancy's Director of Ecology, Beth Myers, will lead the PWCC Program; the Conservancy's Executive Director, Ryan Beltz, will lead the Perki-Bay Expedition. Often, PWCC will be invited to participate in Conservancy programs that are already in place. For example, participants will aid in the Stream Clean-up and the Native Plant Project. These programs are already in existence and funded through other sources. The Conservancy will also host PWCC specific events to ensure that members are exposed to a wide range of environmental topics and are able to engage in a variety of conservation and community projects.
